



Any time we told a hardcore fly fisherman that we were making a film about the Shenandoah Valley, they undoubtedly would ask, "So you're going to have musky, right?" It came down to our last day of filming, but thankfully, we can answer, "Yes". The temps held on for us and the water was crystal clear. As we floated slowly, it was like looking at an aquarium — monster bass, catfish, and carp kept us entertained while we scoured the depths for musky. Musky fishing is a game of patience and persistence. I still don't know how Brian and Colby casted 11- and 12-weight rods with full sinking lines for 8 hours that day. We still had to drag Colby off the water as the darkness of night set-in. We were fortunate enough to get a musky catch on camera and avoid hypothermia while filming the underwater portions. The musky took a chunk out of Brian's thumb and put new meaning to the title, "Blood Knot".

March Special Afternoon Session Shad & Stripers in Downtown Richmond

Join your fellow flyfishers for a seminar/open discussion led by Rob Thomas on the fantastic spring fishery that occurs in our own backyard. We will discuss the tackle, flies and techniques needed for a successful day on the water. A map will be provided to mark the "hotspots". Learn all the rules and regulations as well as identification of species. Historically the Shad show up mid-March and stay until the first of May. Stripers sometimes stay into June. And there are big Stripes in the River. 2011 there were 14 citations(20lbs or greater) issued and 2012 saw 8 citations. Last year a 75 pound fish was caught at Rocketts Landing.

All seminar participants will be entered into a drawing for a dozen flies that have proven deadly for this fishery.

FFV Native Brook Trout Trip to Madison County / Shenandoah National Park

Trip Date: Sunday, April 13

<u>Meet:</u> Graves Mountain Lodge, Syria, VA at 9:00 AM for breakfast (\$9.95 plus tax, plus tip – bring cash). For more information on Graves Mountain Lodge, and directions, you can go to www.gravesmountain.com.

Cost: There is no cost to attend (besides the price of breakfast).

Most of the time, most of the group heads to the nearby Rapidan River after breakfast, but the Rose River, White Oak Canyon Run and other native trout streams are also available to those who would like to try a different stream. Please bring your own lunch and drinks. Those who head to the Rapidan usually meet for lunch beside the stream, but this is your trip and there is no set agenda or schedule. Fish as long as you want and head home when you're ready.

Bring some basic dry flies (Adams, Royal Wulff, Mr. Rapidan, etc.) and basic nymphs (Prince, Hare's Ear, CKs, etc.) in sizes 12 - 18. You can get more creative and check with your local fly shops, if you'd like.

The road into the Rapidan can be pretty rough, so a 4 wheel drive vehicle with some clearance is a good idea. The streams are relatively small, and the fishing requires climbing around and over brush, fallen trees, boulders, etc. The temperature in the mountains can be warm or extremely cold in mid-April, so please check the weather and plan for it to be 10 degrees colder than the Richmond forecast.

High water, extremely cold weather, horrible road conditions into the Rapidan, Polar Vortex, etc. will lead to postponement (hopefully not cancellation) of this trip. There is no limit on the number of FFV members who can go on this trip. We need to give Graves Mountain Lodge an accurate head count for breakfast, so if you do sign up to attend, please let me know if your plans change and you cannot go on the trip. Thanks!

Healing the Earth A Checklist of 25 Things You Can Do

- Reduce plastic use. Last year, Americans threw 21 billion plastic water bottles into landfills, according to the Container Recycling Institute in Washington, DC. Fill (and refill) a container with water from the sink.
- <u>Lighten up!</u> Swap a regular light bulb for an Energy Star-rated <u>compact fluorescent bulb</u>. You will spare the earth 500 pounds of greenhouse gasses over the life of the bulb and save about \$30 in energy costs.
- Lights out! Turn off all lights, appliances, and electrical items that don't need to be on.
- Use heaters and fans. In winter, use a small space heater to warm a room while keeping other areas in the house cooler. In summer, use fans to cut air conditioning use.
- Cook it small. Use a small oven, microwave or the stovetop when preparing a small meal.
 - Set the refrigerator. Set the refrigerator to 38° F, the freezer to 5°F, no colder.
 - Fill up dishwasher. Run the dishwasher only when full, but don't overload. Use the "Rinse and Hold" if an option.
- Clean the lint screen. In clothes dryers, clean the lint screen regularly for more efficient use of the dryer
- Lower hot water. Insulate your water heater. Turn it down to 121° F.
- Shower quickly. Take a quick shower instead of a bath to save water.
- Cold water! Use cold water whenever possible. Use cold water to wash clothes if not heavily soiled.
- Switch suds. Use chlorine-free cleaning products.
- Buy locally. Buy locally produced foods and products, when possible. 75% of items in a grocery store traveled 2000 miles to get there!
- Bag it. Bring your own canvas bags to the grocery store.
 - Recycle it. Learn how to recycle household goods—clothing, motor oil, appliances, furniture, books, toys, etc. and, of course, bottles, cans and paper.
- Buy recycled. Use recycled products, especially paper.
- Compost! Compost kitchen and garden waste, or give it to a friend who can. Nutrients in the water (from garbage disposals) harms the bay and waterways.
- On consignment. Shop at consignment stores, and sell your old items at consignment stores.
- <u>Cut down on disposables</u>. Reduce your use of "disposable" items.
- Tune up! Maintain and tune up your vehicle regularly for maximum gas mileage. Keep tire pressure at recommended levels.
- Leave the car. Walk, use a bicycle, or take a bus or train whenever possible.
- Paint it healthy. When painting a room, use low VOC paint (no fumes) to decrease off gassing that contributes to respiratory problems.
 - Buying "things". Buy products that will last; <u>rent</u> or <u>borrow</u> items you don't use often; maintain and <u>repair</u> the items you own.
- Be a gardener. Plant a garden.
- Share list. Share this list with your friends.
