As is our custom, there will also be an afternoon program starting at 4:00 pm, and Mike will host a presentation entitled "Diverse Opportunities - Adding to Your Life List in Virginia." Both presentations promise to be very informative and a great opportunity to learn about DWR programs and enjoy an evening of fellowship and some outstanding food!

We will follow this meeting with an outdoor club picnic at Duck Down Inn on Thursday, September 16 and our annual banquet at The Place on Friday, November 12. The 14 attendees were made up of five Physicians, five Registered Nurses, one Physician Assistant, two Nurse Practitioner, and one Licensed Clinical Social Worker, and they work at Riverside Walter Reed Hospital in Gloucester, Virginia Commonwealth University Medical Center, HCA Retreat Doctors' Hospital, and Hunter Holmes McGuire VA Medical Center. The fly fishing guides and instructors were all FFV members – so a big shout out to Robert Thomas, Tony Scrimizzi, Tom Milot, Marvin Williams, Bob Hicks, Dan Genest, David Piotrowski, Rick Hendrickson, Mac Myers, Ed Landry, and Steve Lindsey! Well done, folks! The retreat was so popular that a second one will be held at Duck Down Inn on June 25.

On a more somber note, I note with great sadness the passing of long-time member Phil Johnson. Phil was a dynamic presence at FFV with his passion for tying flies, promoting Project Healing Waters, and all things fly fishing. He was a friend to many of us, and we shall sorely miss his presence and many contributions.

Phil's way was to give all he could to the job at hand and when he reached the place he felt he had done all he could, he moved on to somewhere else to start doing good again. 

The Fly Fishers of Virginia (FFV)

was established in 1982 to promote the art of fly rod fishing; to foster good sportsmanship; and to promote conservation of the nation's natural resources.

During the year, six dinner meetings are occasions for informational programs pertaining to the many aspects of fly fishing and conservation activities. Programs are presented by international and local experts and celebrities in the fly fishing world, as well as knowledgeable FFV members.

Fishing trips are scheduled each year for cold water, warm water, and saltwater species.

Educational programs for members and the public, as well as seminars and workshops are scheduled periodically.

Fly tying classes are offered each winter: Beginning, Intermediate, or Advanced, depending on demand. Casting clinics are also available.

The club gives financial support to several conservation and fly fishing related organizations, including: James River Association; Wildlife Foundation of Virginia and special projects of the VDGIF; The Chesapeake Bay Foundation; Coastal Conservation Association, Project Healing Waters, Reel Recovery, Casting for Recovery, and The Brotherhood of the Jungle Cock and the CHMS Fly Fishing Club.
